Henry Emerson (Hank) Bond



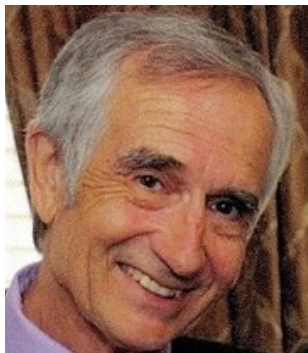

George H. Geiger

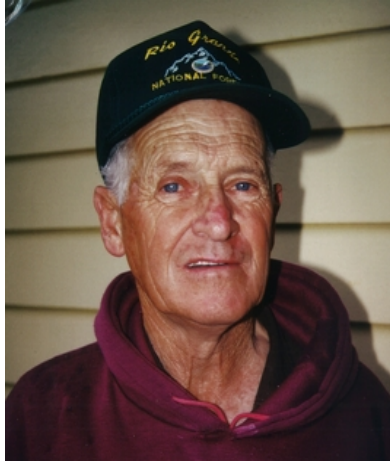

Donald Eugene (Don) Kistler

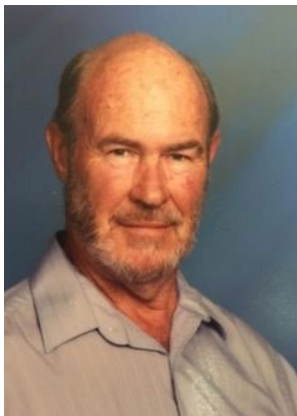

Stanley Demond Mason

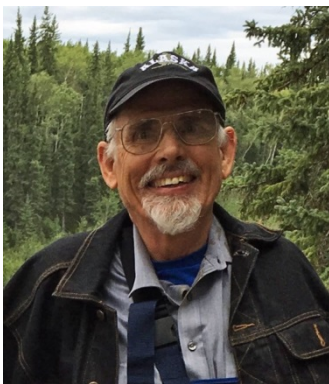

Daryle Eugene Gibson

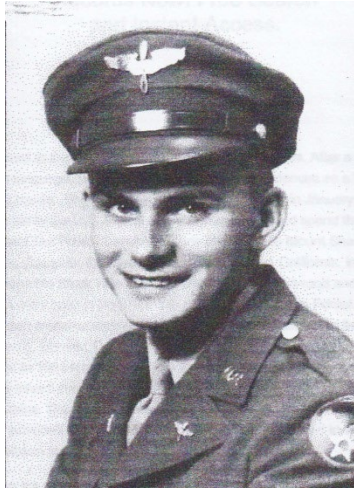
