### What is Memorial Grove?

The Memorial Grove was established in 1920 to honor Rocky Mountain Region soldiers killed in WW1. The next year a memorial ceremony was held on May 29, 1921, at the Grove and 30 trees were planted to recognize not only the five soldiers who died during World War I but also for other Forest Service employees who had died while officially with the Service. The original Grove had a memorial tree named, mapped and planted for each of the employees who had lost their lives.

The Grove is located on the grounds of the old Monument Tree Nursery, now the Monument Fire Center on the Pikes Peak District of the Pike and San Isabel National Forest. The Memorial Grove was established by using transplanted Englemann spruce, blue spruce and Douglas-fir trees from the Fremont Experimental Forest on nearby Pikes Peak.

Today's Memorial Grove continues to recognize and celebrate the careers, dedication and contributions of all those Rocky Mountain Region employees who have died and left their legacies for future generations to help manage the National Forests and Grasslands of the Rocky Mountain Region. The Memorial Grove ceremony also offers a special time and place to honor family members and friends of Forest Service employees for their critical support and personal sacrifices that contributed to the success of their loved and honored ones and the mission of the USDA-Forest Service.

After the Berry Fire in 1989, which partially burned a part of the Grove, it was decided a fitting monument with individual name plaques, attached annually, would be an appropriate replacement to honor past employees. One young tree continues to be added each year to the Grove to commemorate all honorees of the year, and to maintain a living memorial to those who personally served the Rocky Mountain Region and their country.

Since 1995, a memorial ceremony has been conducted on the first Saturday in May to highlight and reflect on those special employees who helped make the Rocky Mountain Region a special place to live, work and raise families. Substantial work has been done on the Memorial Grove site to make it unique setting for solitude and reflection.

The awareness of the Grove and its role in maintaining the special character and history of the Rocky Mountain Region continues to grow. Current and retired employees of the Region, the Pikes Peak Ranger District, and the Rocky Mountaineers sponsor the dedication ceremony, and deeply appreciate the support and financial contributions of employees, family and friends to maintain this very special setting and the memories it provides.

## John Douglas Beckley




John Douglas Beckley passed away September 22, 2022, at his home in Cedaredge Colorado. He was born in Pocatello, ID on March 22, 1944, to James Beckley and Gertrude (Bowness) Beckley. John was raised in Cedaredge where the family home was at the State fish hatchery his father worked. He graduated from Cedaredge High School in 1962,

where his father worked. He graduated from Cedaredge High School in 1962, he worked on a trail crew on the Grand Mesa NF then received a degree from Mesa College before four years in the Army.

After his military service, he received a his Forestry degree from Utah State and began work as a fire fighter on the Gila and Kaibab NF in Region 3 and then moved on the Pine District of the San Juan NF. In 1974 he was on the Brush Creek and then the Laramie District of the Medicine Bow NF. In 1987 he transferred to the Sulphur District of the Arapaho NF primarily working in recreation management. In the late '80 and early '90s he took an assignment on the Juneau District of the Tongass NF in Alaska working in recreation and trail management. He then returned to Region 2 as a Recreation Project Manager on the Grand Mesa Uncompahgre, Gunnison NF. He then had assignments in both R-3 and R-4 in wilderness management and special uses and retired in 2010.

He was an outstanding wildlife and outdoors photographer and established a business of framing and selling his large collection of images. He was a hunter and an avid fly fisherman, he also collected and built split bamboo fly rods. He collected Native American southwest art, pottery, arrowheads, jewelry and kachinas.

He is survived by his wife Mary Marquardt Beckley and sister Janet E. Beckley.



# Gaines Wright Bearden

Gaines Wright Bearden died on January 14, 2022. He was born in Standing Pine, MS on December 5, 1941, to Virginia Wright Bearden Trigleth and Matthew Gaines Bearden. He grew up in Rolling Fork, MS, and joined the Army National Guard right after graduating high

school in 1959, from which he was honorably discharged in 1968. During his service he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology from Delta State University in Cleveland, MS. After earning his degree in 1964, he continued with graduate courses and taught school before starting a long career with the U.S. Forest Service in 1966, which took him west. He retired in 1995 as the Personnel Director of the Rocky Mountain Region. After retirement, he enjoyed traveling with his wife both domestically and internationally.

Throughout his life he held a great love of the outdoors, spending as much of his free time as possible hunting, fishing, camping, and hiking. He was also an accomplished musician who played trumpet and guitar, finding friends to play music with wherever he lived. He met his wife Joanna while playing in a folk band together in college, and they were married in 1964. In his later years, he created folk art crosses which were displayed in galleries in Denver and New Mexico.

He is survived by his wife of 57 years, Joanna Harvey Bearden, his son Brian Gaines Bearden, and daughter Kelly Margaret Bearden. He is also survived by his siblings Jeff Bearden, Willy Bearden, and Debby Walker.



## Richard P. (Dick) Cook

**Richard P. (Dick) Cook** of Norwood, CO, passed away Sept. 9, 2022, in Spring, Texas. Dick was born in Bartlesville, OK, on December 21, 1939, to Kraft and Dorothy Cook.

Dick graduated from Oklahoma State University with a degree in forestry and then joined the Forest Service in Dubois, Wyoming, as assistant ranger. He was later transferred to Pagosa Springs, Colorado, and spent six years there.

He married Carol Cook in 1968 and moved to Black Hills as a forester and lived in Lead, Deadwood, Belle Fourche, and Spearfish. In Spearfish, he was promoted to district ranger. In 1976 he transferred to Norwood, CO and for the next 23 years he was district ranger for the Grand Mesa, Gunnison, and Uncompangre National Forests. He retired in 1999.

While in Norwood, he was instrumental in major expansions of the Telluride Ski Area. His duties also included forest management and working with local ranchers and timber companies to obtain various Forest Service permits. During his years with the Forest Service, he spent many fire seasons across the western U.S., most notably being the 1988 Yellowstone fire in which he served as one of the five fire bosses for that fire. He retired from the Forest Service after 35 years.

He was a longtime member of the Elks Club and a lifetime member of The Rocky Mountaineers. He loved construction work and built four homes over the years. He enjoyed farming, camping, fishing, hunting with pack mules, and generally just being outdoors. Dick enjoyed traveling and exploring much of the U.S. and Canada.

He is survived by his wife Carol of 53 years; daughter Debbie Cook Harbin of Spring, TX; son Mike Cook of Lake Jackson, TX; three granddaughters; two great-grandchildren, and a brother, Don Cook of KS.



### Adrian Dargan



**Adrian Dargan**, passed away on November 4, 2022. He was born November 27, 1938, to Theodore and Opal Dargan. He was an adventurous youngster who loved the outdoors, hunting and fishing with his father.

Even though some questioned his choice, he chose to pursue a career that would feed his passion for the outdoors. He was not deterred from fulfilling his dream and breaking barriers by earning a degree from the School of Forestry at Oklahoma State. While in college, he met his one and only, Brunell Manning, a student at a nearby college and they were married on December 30, 1961.

Adrian served in the Army and after his discharge began his Forest Service career on the Coeur d'Alene NF in Idaho...making him the first African American professionally educated forester to be hired by the Forest Service. Adrian worked on three national forests in Idaho and Montana before transferring to the Pike and San Isabel NF. In his career he planted many a tree, worked in timber, wildlife, recreation, and fire management.

He retired in 1993 and was always active in the community, his church, and loved his time with family. He loved old westerns and often listened to jazz while watching westerns. He had a keen interest in the history of Black people and American Indians and their intersection in the western United States, especially the Buffalo Soldiers and the settling of the West. He personified integrity and dependability and was a wonderful provider for his family. Adrian was an inspiration to all who knew him and left behind a proud legacy of a life well lived.

He is survived by his wife of 61 years Brunell, his sister Dr. Olita Dargan Harris, his daughter Monique, and sons Adrian and Theodore, and five grandsons: Aram, Jordan, Matthew, Jade, Isaiah, and great-granddaughter Ellyia.




#### **Lois Elaine Warfel**
